Artists of all ages and abilities are invited to register for an Anime Your Way drawing workshop scheduled for June 18 to 20 at Roseburg Public Library.

Former Simpsons artist Carlos Nieto III will teach a comprehensive, step-by-step program in which participants create and modify an anime character from scratch. Anime is a type of art that originated in Japan and is often adapted from Japanese comics called manga.

The library has a large selection of manga, primarily in the junior and teen sections. Popular series include Pokémon, One Piece, Chainsaw Man, and The Promised Neverland.

Nieto will teach three classes daily. All sessions will be free and last two hours. Participants may attend only one session.

Classes for youth ages 9 through 12 will be held from 10 a.m.-12 p.m. June 18, 19 and 20. Children must be at least 9 years old on the day of the program to participate.

Classes for teens 13 through 17 will be held from 2-4 p.m. June 18, 19 and 20.

Classes for adults 18 and older will be held from 6-8 p.m. June 18 and 19.

A class for families with at least one child and one adult will be held from 6-8 p.m. June 20. Children must be at least 9 years old.
