Roseburg Library Celebrates the Summer Reading Program Kris Wiley for The News-Review

The Summer Reading Program may be over, but Roseburg Public Library still is basking in the glow of an amazing 12 weeks of special activities and reading fun for all ages.

Youth logged an outstanding 354,480 minutes of reading. More than 300 children read at least seven hours, and 246 of them completed the program by reading for 21 hours. Although 72 fewer youth participated in the program than last year, there was an increase of 58 children who completed it.

The book review portion of the program remained popular with 217 youth submitting 1,534 reviews. Those numbers, too, were down compared with last year (276 children and 2,106 reviews).

The library distributed 3,000 new, free books at the library and during outreach events. My favorite part of the Summer Reading Program was watching kids select a book for their personal library when they logged seven hours of reading.

I also loved peeking in at some of Youth Services Librarian Aurora Ropp's 73 special events that were enjoyed by nearly 3,800 people.

Adult readers also participated in the Summer Reading Program. Sixty-one people logged 1,059 books. That was the same number of readers as last year, but they read 96 more books.

Sixty-seven adults submitted 441 book reviews, a decrease of 21 readers and 195 books compared with last year.
